NORTHAMPTON — A television documentary about figure skating based on a manuscript by a Smith College senior will air on PBS nationwide tomorrow and locally on Saturday.

The documentary, "Gustave Lussi: The Man Who Changed Skating," profiles Gustave Lussi, one of the world's foremost figure-skating teachers.

Cecily Morrow, an Ada Comstock Scholar at Smith, studied under Lussi in the early 1970s and turned a manual on his techniques into a documentary script. She was consultant and associate producer for the documentary television show, produced at WCFE-TV in Plattsburgh, N.Y.

The documentary will air locally at 8 a.m. Saturday on Channel 57.
